

**South Central Yearly Meeting of Friends
Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business

Session I: Monday, 11 April, 7:30 - 9:00pm

Friends gathered after the appointed time. Karen Takemoto introduced herself as presiding clerk and welcomed everyone to the first session. Since Jessica Arjet, recording clerk, had to work tonight, Liz Yeats will serve as recording clerk.

Clerk asked us to take a few minutes to silently reflect in our minds and hearts about the Indigenous peoples whose land we reside on.

Clerk introduced and expressed gratitude for the Tech Event Committee. Kevin King, Edwin Campbell, Anne Collins, Scott Carmack tonight. Liz Wolf and Leslie Cotton are on the committee and will be assisting us later in the week.

Call for Friends to create the SCYM 2022 Epistle: Emma Britain Carraway is the only one who has currently has volunteered. The clerk asked that others consider such service.

Quaker EarthCare Witness Representatives Report: Andrea Beane read the report from Quaker Earthcare Witness. She told us about her experience at Line 3 which was very positive as an example of a community working together to bring change. Andrea told us of that she is involved in continuing action at the Enbridge Line in South TX and she is going to be active about that.

John Coffin asked whether, if we were to look at all of our meetings around the country, are there big disparities in how meetings are approaching this issue. Andrea answered that many meetings have moved the issue of earth care closer to the top. The continued crisis, and our ability and necessity to do something about it, seems more pressing. YM Minute 2022.1 - South Central Yearly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) stands concerned for the people of Ukraine who are suffering from the invasion by Russia. We stand resolute for the human rights of all people across the world and against violence toward civilians as we are seeing occurring in Ukraine. Yet as we criticize Russia for its military incursions, we must recognize our own country's military actions, killing of civilians, and operations to overthrow democratically elected governments from Asia to Central and South America. We cannot be in integrity when we ask the International Criminal Court to pursue Russia while not allowing it to pursue the US for our crimes in Afghanistan and the humanitarian crisis left behind. We cannot condemn Russia for its mass destruction in Ukraine without remembering our "Shock and Awe" campaign against Iraq. We cannot consider ourselves virtuous by passing supplementary funding for Ukraine when the same bill increases funding for Israel, funding that supports the violation of human rights and a more than fifty-year occupation of the Palestinian people. And we cannot turn a blind eye to our recent support of Saudi Arabia and its bombardment and blockade of the people in Yemen and other areas in our hemisphere

where the US has intervened militarily and with military aid. It is therefore a time for reflection for us as we discern what we can do to promote our testimonies of Peace, Community, Integrity, and Equality in both our country and across the world. Quaker testimony for over 350 years has affirmed the value of life while actively seeking to build peace among all nations and addressing root causes of violence. As Quakers, we grieve the loss of life from the senseless aggression we are seeing in Ukraine and elsewhere. We know there are people in Russia and Ukraine and throughout the world working tirelessly for peace and reconciliation. We uphold and stand in solidarity with them and call on our elected officials to find the courage to join all peacemakers in the Ukrainian and other conflicts. A

YM Minute 2022.2 - South Central Yearly Meeting supports the “Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding School Policies Act” - S.2907 — 117th Congress (2021-2022), that was introduced to the U.S. Senate on September 30, 2021, by Senator Elizabeth Warren, at the request of U.S. Secretary of the Interior, Debra Haaland. The purpose of the bill is to set up a Truth and Healing Commission to address the historical trauma experienced by Native American, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian children who were forcibly removed from their homes between 1869 and the 1960s and placed in Indian Boarding schools. The children were taught to reject their Native languages, cultures, and spiritual practices and adopt Euro-American culture. Native Americans continue to suffer multigenerational trauma caused by this policy of forced assimilation and cultural genocide. Quakers were among the strongest supporters of the Indian boarding school policy and operated some 30 Indian schools (some in collaboration with the federal government) for varying periods of time. Further, the commission must develop recommendations on ways to (1) protect unmarked graves and accompanying land protections; (2) support repatriation and identify the tribal nations from which children were taken; and (3) discontinue the removal of American Indian, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian children from their families and tribal communities by state social service departments, foster care agencies, and adoption agencies. SCYM urges Friends to watch for this bill and give it their support. SCYM further urges Friends to learn the history of the Quaker Indian schools and consider ways to support indigenous-managed healing processes, including programs to teach indigenous languages.

Write your senators to request it be passed. It has been read twice and we need to encourage it to move forward. Encourage them to cosponsor the bill. The Oklahoma senator, Jane Langford is on the committee that covers Indian Affairs.

Discussion followed:

- Do we have space in our budget to send aid to Ukraine? The Peace and Justice Committee has \$6800 to send to different organizations. They do not need approval from the Yearly Meeting. We are not boxed into these amounts and organizations. Peace and Justice can ask for an increase from the Finance Committee.
- Will inflation affect this budget? The event costs might go up, but the current operating budget isn't affected. Costs are rising, but we'll know more before Representatives Meeting.
- We might need more infrastructure to support these young activists that have been visiting this weekend. For example, Quaker Volunteer Service. If young friends within SCYM are interested in activism, we do have funds that might be helpful for these activities. Ministry and Care are the ones who administer these funds.
- Could we consider legacy contributions? The yearly meeting is not ready for that.
- It is possible to designate a donation to spiritual enrichment funds to support individuals to come to Yearly Meeting or go to Gathering. These opportunities need to be more widely known.
- There are funds available for spring lobby weekend, fgc, etc.
- Monthly Meetings also often have funds for travel.

Many people equate criticism of the State of Israel with antisemitism. This minute is only about the government and is not aimed at any religion.

YM Minute 2022.3 -

As a community of faith, we believe in the intrinsic value of all people. We, South Central Yearly Meeting (Quakers from Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana), seek to nurture peace, health, and justice for all Palestinians and Israelis living in the Middle East and in the diaspora.

We honor all Holy Land faith traditions, including Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Druze, the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers), and all others that have contributed to the rich cultural diversity of the region. We stand with and hold in the Light our fellow Quakers who continue to suffer through the daily violations of their human rights imposed by Israeli military for more than half a century. Quakers established a school in Palestine, more than three quarters of a century before Israel became a state, the only school in the West Bank that offers the International Baccalaureate degree today.

We encourage discussion about Israel's current military occupation of and human rights violations in Palestine.

We challenge ourselves and others to ask thoughtful questions of those who support the military occupation, being especially mindful of the need for all peoples to have:

- resources of food, water, and sustainable farms,
- infrastructure of electricity,
- access to ancestral fishing grounds in the Mediterranean Sea along the entire coast, especially Gaza,
- safe housing, including new homes and those of ancient ancestry,
- freedom to worship safely in churches, mosques, and synagogues,
- safe education of all children,
- revitalization of hospitals,
- free access for everyone to roads and towns to bring goods to market and businesses throughout Palestine/Israel.

As Friends (Quakers), we are committed to helping to bring awareness of and an end to military occupation and human rights violations within Palestine/Israel.

We seek to divest ourselves of any investments in companies supporting military occupation and human rights violations, including companies that:

1. Provide products or services that contribute to violent acts that target either Israeli or Palestinian civilians,
2. Provide products or services that contribute to the maintenance of the Israeli military dominance of Gaza and the West Bank, including East Jerusalem,
3. Provide products or services that contribute to the maintenance and expansion of Israeli settlements in the occupied Palestinian territories,

4. Provide products or services that contribute to the maintenance and construction of the Separation Wall.

As members of the Religious Society of Friends who believe that all women and men are our sisters and brothers, we are led to take effective actions like the above responding to the suffering of the Palestinian people until the Occupation has ended and the basic human rights of those living under the intolerable conditions of this Occupation are secured.
